(1) Outline

Tottori University emphasizes the importance of its relation with the communities, promoting practical studies with the educational principle "Fusion of Knowledge and Practice". Tottori University has four faculties: Regional Sciences, Medicine, Engineering and Agriculture. The Faculty of Regional Sciences is a unique faculty that promotes researches of Eastern Asia. The university has conducted several large scale and highly evaluated research programs sponsored by the Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology(MEXT).

Our program "Global Human Resources Development Project" had been selected by MEXT(2012~2016), and made an effort on globalization of university education and development of global human resources.

There are a lot of opportunities to exchange with Japanese students through Japanese class and International exchange club events.

4 Features of Tottori

- •Tottori is surrounded by the Sea and Mountains, and is very comfortable city to live in with cheaper living expenses compared to big cities.

(7) Course Descriptions

Take any Common Course Subjects, specialized subjects provided by the Faculty, or by the Center for International Affairs suit to the students' interest. (No credits are given to the subjects provided by Center for International Affairs)

1) Required Subjects

Specialist Japanese

Give presentations and write essays on various topics. Then, proceed to own researches through making a final presentation, and conducting a research report in the second semester in Japanese.

- •Regional Cultures and Industries of Japan Visit companies, cultural facilities and have discussions about what we learned there.
- * The subjects above are offered by Center for International Affairs especially for Japanese Studies Students, and no credits are given to them.

- 2) Hands-on Learning in the Community
- •Regional Cultures and Industries of Japan (same as the above)
- · Japanese Culture (Common Course Subjects)
- Japanese Society (Common Course Subjects)
 These courses includes lectures, discussions, and visits to facilities in order to interact with local people.
- Contents of Completion Research
 To complete the final report based on their topics.
- 4) Opportunities to study with Japanese students

There are a lot of opportunities to exchange and experience Japanese culture with Japanese students through Japanese class and International exchange activities, such as ski trip, local society related Yukata wearing class. agricultural work, volunteer work, and so on.

- 5) Elective Courses and other Coursework <Common Course Subjects>
- Japanese in Practice

Learn academic skills for college-life through practice.

• Expressing Technique of Japanese

Learn how to express more properly orally or in writing by discussions among the students.

·Computer Skills in Japanese

Learn how to use PC for research by practicing basic operation and inputting sentences in Japanese.

Judge the level by placement test. Four
different level classes are provided. Students
can acquire comprehensive language abilities.

<Other Subjects>

Choose other subjects from Common Course Subjects or specialized subjects provided by the Faulty of Regional Sciences, consulting with supervisors.
