Tottori University arid lands research centre campus has a good well known global reputation as it has significantly contributed through its robust research network to sustainable livelihoods in the dry areas across the world. Water harvesting would be one of viable practices under restriction of conventional water resource development.

A so unique tourist destination that clearly brings out the uniqueness of Tottori prefecture in Japan. Any time am lonely I visit the sand dunes and I feel refreshed.

At the end of the two weeks, I travelled to Tottori University in Tottori city. Here, I have met many other international students who have made my stay fun. However, so far, I haven't had much of an experience about Japanese life and culture because of the COVID-19 restrictions. Nevertheless, I have had some nice experiences in the last few months of my stay. Japanese culture is truly unique and very different from the life I am used to in Nairobi. Here in Japan, there seems to be fewer random interactive activities as many prefer staying alone or not taking the first step on most occasions. Interestingly, one can literally live off supplies from vending machines located in even unlikely locations around the city. Japanese food is wonderful too as most of the food tastes similar to some Kenyan recipes. I love Japanese grilled cow meat served with rice and ocha (Japanese tea). However, everything seems so expensive.

I have also heard stories that it is not acceptable to give small tips contrary to the Kenyan culture where it is almost assumed not tipping is a form of stinginess. Actually, I'm informed, tipping is unacceptable and is considered offensive. Also, recently I forgot to take my one yen from the money machine and the teller came running apologetically with my one yen, just one yen! In my mind I was like, who will do that in Kenya for just one shilling, just a shilling! Maybe not even me, hehe.

In my first month of stay here, I got the opportunity of joining other international students for city tour around Tottori city. I was particularly fascinated by the traditional Japanese house called Minka. This family building history dates back to 400 years. I was amazed to hear that it is the only house that withstood a devastating earthquake and fire disasters that occurred a few years after World War II. It is worth noticing that many of the traditional architectures such as temples, shrines and castles still have the Japanese traditional building styles. Currently, Japanese family houses have evolved to incorporate some western building styles.

These has been my experience here at Tottori as I seek my academic dream, it can be your experience too.
